

Attainment Matters

Why does it matter?

Higher attainment levels positively impact the individual, local community, and state of Florida:



Florida's Workers:

increased job opportunity, higher earnings, decreased likelihood of unemployment over a lifetime, enhanced skills



Taxpayers:

increased civic engagement, improved economic impact, decreased population who need public assistance



Local Business Leaders:

increased ability to meet current and future talent needs, enhanced worker productivity, business development and growth, economic development




Universities & Colleges:

increased enrollment, increased demand for educated talent pool

Note: These data represent the count of awards conferred in 2015-16. It is possible for a student to have earned more than one degree. Students, particularly those in upper-division programs, may already hold a lower-division credential. Completions contribute to a state's attainment level, but completion is not synonymous with attainment, as attainment reflects the percent of the population with postsecondary credentials.




Migration in Florida

21.5% Born in Florida Not Born in Florida 78.5%


Education by Migration





Demand for Educated Workers: 2025

- Nationally, 64% of jobs will require education beyond high school, which represents 1,000,000+ additional credentials
- Florida will add six million more residents and will need to create two million net new jobs by 2030, according to Florida Chamber Foundation






States with Attainment Goals

In response to the increasing demand for jobs that require education and training beyond high school, 40 states, including Florida, have adopted attainment goals.








Three-Year Attainment Rate Changes, by County, 2016

Florida and America face an urgent and growing need for talent, specifically among adults 25 to 64 with postsecondary degrees or credentials qualified to fill high-wage, high-skill job openings anticipated by 2025.



Our Initiative

The Higher Education Coordinating Council (HECC) understands the most powerful indicator of economic development and healthy communities is educational attainment and is committed to ensuring Florida has the talent needed to meet the growing economy and population. On November 28, 2016, the council approved a motion to establish a statewide attainment goal of 55 percent to be reached by the year 2025.



Strategies to Increase Attainment

 Continue to support all education sectors defining key performance metrics to align with statewide higher education policy and fiscal goals

 Continue and broaden commitment to seamless articulation from K-12 to the colleges and between the colleges and universities through guided pathways



Strategies to Increase Attainment (Continued)

 Strengthen partnerships with business and economic development by ensuring program alignment to workforce needs

 Expand incentives to promote collaboration and engagement between the business community and education system
