Our mission:

Support districts in providing a safe and secure learning environment for students and educators

OSS serves as a central repository for best practices, training standards and compliance oversight in all matters regarding school safety and security



2018 Legislation: SB 7026

- Senate Bill 7026 included:
 - MSD Public Safety Commission
 - Creation of the Office of Safe Schools
 - Designation of a School Safety Specialist in each district
 - FortifyFL
 - Safe-School Officer requirement
 - Coach Aaron Feis Guardian Program
 - Expansion of mental health efforts
 - School Self-Assessment requirement (FSSAT)
 - Additional funds for school safety and mental health
 - Safety training and drill requirements





2019 Legislation: SB 7030

- Senate Bill 7030 included:
 - Development of a behavioral threat assessment tool
 - Requirement for SESIR rule for incident reporting
 - Clarification of school safety requirements for charter schools
 - School Hardening and Harm Mitigation Workgroup
 - Requirements for promoting FortifyFL by school districts
 - Compliance authority for FDOE on school safety issues





Behavioral Threat Assessment

- In Aug. 2019, DOE adopted the Comprehensive School Threat Assessment Guidelines (CSTAG) model for behavioral threat assessment to be used in schools statewide.
- OSS provides train-the-trainer seminars for district threat assessment liaisons and provides training directly to school threat assessment team members.
- By Aug. 2020, OSS reviewed all district and charter school procedures for compliance with statutory requirements and alignment to CSTAG model.



School Environmental Safety Incident Reporting (SESIR)



- New stand-alone SESIR Rule approved in May 2020 (Rule 6A-1.0017)
 - Rule provides clarity in reporting requirements and addresses concerns raised by MSD Commission
 - Rule was developed with feedback and assistance from district safety specialists and partners from other agencies, including FDLE and DJJ
- OSS updated SESIR website and training materials to correspond with the new rule
- OSS continues to provide training to districts and charter schools concerning SESIR reporting



Regional Staff Assigned to Visit Schools


Realigned 10 DOE positions for the Office, to include 6 regional compliance and support personnel

Compliance Authority

 Announced and unannounced monitoring visits to schools

 School visits are documented via the Florida Safe School Assessment Tool (FSSAT)

- Staff provide technical assistance and guidance on safety requirements and best practices
- Issues are relayed for prompt remediation





Enhancing Compliance Efforts

- Regional staff provided with ongoing training
- Focus on specific vulnerabilities and communicating concerns of noncompliance
- OSS working with General Counsel to establish a rule to:
 - Identify concerns of noncompliance
 - Clarify steps taken to communicate and address issues
 - Resolve the concerns in a timely manner





School Safety Support and Intervention

The Office will focus on elements required in statute such as:

- safe-school officer on every campus
- threat assessment teams training, composition, etc.
- active assailant response plan/training
- SESIR reporting
- emergency drills
- promoting FortifyFL
- mobile panic alert system (for 2021-22 school year)



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
