Approval of Rule 6A-6.0531, F.A.C., Reading Achievement Initiative for Scholastic Excellence (RAISE)



Reading Achievement Initiative for Scholastic Excellence (RAISE) Act

- Establishes 20 literacy support regions, at the direction of a regional literacy support director to improve literacy outcomes for students.
- Identifies criteria for RAISE schools to receive regional support.
- Launches a tutoring program and develops training to prepare high school students to tutor K-3 students with reading difficulties.



Identification of RAISE Schools

- A district school serving students in K-5 must be identified for supports, regardless of its school grade, if:
 - 50% of its students score below a Level 3 for any grade level on the statewide, standardized English Language Arts assessment; or
 - Progress monitoring data collected from the coordinated screening and progress monitoring system shows that 50% or more of the students are not on track to pass the statewide, standardized grade 3 English Language Arts assessment for any grade level kindergarten through grade 3. (Not applicable until the 2023-24 school year)

The proposed rule adds a criterion:

 At least 10 students must be present for both the second and third fulltime equivalent (FTE) survey periods and still be enrolled at the time of statewide, standardized testing.



Supports for RAISE Schools

- Identified RAISE schools must:
 - Receive support from a State Regional Literacy Director (SRLD); and
 - Implement a school improvement plan (SIP) that explicitly addresses strategies for improving reading performance.

The proposed rule:

- Describes the supports SRLDs provide; and
- Explains the process for SIP development and/or amending SIP to explicitly address strategies for improving reading performance.



RAISE Tutoring Program

 Prepares eligible high school students to tutor students in grades K-3 in RAISE schools.

The proposed rule:

- Establishes July 1 as the deadline for districts to notify the Department if they plan to participate in the tutoring program; and
- Creates a process to recognize high school students who provide 75 hours of tutoring as New Worlds Scholars.



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
