# Celebrate Literacy Week, Florida! January 24 - January 28, 2022


#### Monday, January 24<sup>th</sup>

#### Kick Off Celebrate Literacy Week!

- School administrators read aloud a snippet of a favorite book during morning announcements, and Tweet pictures to @MDCPS\_ELA, #LeadersRead, #MiamiReads.
- Create a school-wide literacy 2022 bulletin board titled "Blast Off Into New Worlds".
  - 1. Teachers lead class discussions about the message of our 2022 Florida Literacy Week theme: Launch Into Literacy, Blast Off Into New Worlds!
  - 2. Collaborative Conversation: How can we explore new places through the books we read? How do books teach us about the world we live in? How is reading like a rocket launching into space?
  - Teacher-led instruction: Literary and Informational texts are a fundamental and primary form of communicating and learning about places and the world around us.

Share examples:















Books help us to visualize and even mind travel to new places. With vivid descriptions and lots of details, authors and illustrators transform words into adventures. We learn about places one book at a time.

- Students draw and/or write to describe the setting or place they "visited" while reading.
- Post/Publish descriptions on your school-wide literacy 2022 bulletin board titled "Blast Off Into New Worlds!".

### **Explore New Worlds**

- Using District resources such as Tumblebooks, Discovery Education, NBC Learn, Teaching Books, or one of the B.E.S.T Literature Library books included in your McGraw Hill bundle, participate in collaborative discussions that ask and answer questions with a focus on setting. Engage students in before, during, and after reading strategies to support and enhance the learning (e.g., graphic organizers, summarizing strategies, picture notes, reflective journals)
  - 1. Read story aloud.
  - 2. Reread and discuss setting, place, and time.
  - 3. Reread to understand details, ideas, and/or perspectives.
  - Students illustrate what was learned and include a dictated or written paragraph describing the illustration.
  - 5. Select a visible location to share student work.

#### **Expand the World**

- Join M-DCPS Division of Student Services, M-DCPS English/Language Arts Department and the Anti-Defamation League (ADL) for a live virtual Read4Respect event at 9:30 a.m.
- Tami Charles, author of All Because You Matter, will be reading this heartfelt book which reminds children of all races, religions, and ethnicities that they matter.
- The event is open to all elementary schools and K-8 centers.
- All schools that participate in the event will receive a free copy of All Because You Matter.
- Schools that wish to participate must register by Friday, January 21, 2022. Registration is limited to two devices per school.
  - Schools are encouraged to use interactive whiteboards to view the read aloud in order to maximize participation on the two devices.
- Schools can use this discussion guide as a supplementary literacy resource to extend the reach of this event.

### Friday, January 28<sup>th</sup>

#### **Celebrate New Worlds**

- Plan a "New Worlds Reading Celebration" begin by having students present information orally to talk about a place they learned about.
- After completing the oral presentations, share connections by creating a digital or paperpencil class book, poster, mural, or study board detailing the travels and adventures experienced this week. Go digital and create a Sway presentation.

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Monday, January 24 <sup>th</sup>	<ul> <li>School administrators Read Aloud a snippet of their favorite book addressing the theme of the 2022 Florida Literacy Week during morning announcements. Tweet pictures to @M-DCPS Secondary ELA/Reading, @MDCPSAcademics, #MiamiReads, #Leaders Read.</li> <li>In class, students will discuss the following in small groups:         <ul> <li>What is setting? How do you define setting?</li> <li>How does literature help us blast off into new worlds?</li> <li>Describe a text or novel that made you feel transported to a new world.</li> <li>What literary elements and/or devices did the author use in the text or novel to create the feeling that you were blasting into a new world?</li> </ul> </li> <li>Students will participate in a "quick-write" activity addressing the theme of our 2022 Florida Literacy Week: Launch Into Literacy, Blast Into New Worlds!</li> <li>School administrators choose top quick-writes to tweet pictures to @M-DCPS Secondary ELA/Reading, @MDCPSAcademics, #MiamiReads, #LiteracyWeekKickOff</li> </ul>
Tuesday, January 25 <sup>th</sup>	<ul> <li>Pair Up Songs and Poems</li> <li>Students read several poems.</li> <li>Students find a poem(s) with the theme of blasting into a new world.</li> <li>Students must use a poem to connect to with the theme of a song that also represents blasting into a new world.</li> <li>Students create a small poster representing the correlation with the poem and the song.</li> <li>Students submit their Pair Up Songs and Poems to their teacher or school administration.</li> <li>School Administrators choose winning works and tweet them to @M-DCPS Secondary ELA/Reading, @MDCPSAcademics, #MiamiReads,</li> </ul>

Thursday, January 27 <sup>th</sup>	<ul> <li>My Snapchat Chapter</li> <li>Students choose a story with which they have made a connection.</li> <li>Students create a video in Snapchat answering the following questions:         <ul> <li>What was the best part of the book/story? The worst part?</li> <li>How do you feel about it now?</li> <li>If you could talk to anyone in this book/story, who would you choose, and what would you say?</li> </ul> </li> <li>Schools tweet their winners to @M-DCPS Secondary ELA/Reading, @MDCPSAcademics, #MiamiReads, #MySnapchatChapter.</li> </ul>
Friday, January 28 <sup>th</sup>	<ul> <li>My TikTok Tale</li> <li>Students choose a story with which they have made text-to-world connection.</li> <li>Students create a TikTok answering the following questions:         <ul> <li>What does this remind you of in the real world?</li> <li>How are events in this story similar to things that happen to you in the real world?</li> <li>Student can answer the questions by acting out a scene where they are the character in their own lives.</li> </ul> </li> <li>Schools tweet their winners to @M-DCPS Secondary ELA/Reading, @MDCPSAcademics, #MiamiReads, #MyTikTokTale.</li> </ul>

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- Book Bout: Participating schools in grades 6-12 will select a student team to represent them, as the ELA staff engage students through various activities to taste the kind of discussions that are typical of book clubs. School teams attend the Café de ELA "Book Tasting" event to showcase the selections to competing schools and activities to follow.
- PIANO SLAM: In partnership with Dranoff 2 Piano Foundation students in grades 6-12 will participate in live poetry and music lessons.
- Do the Write Thing: Students in grades 6-8 can participate in this writing program organized by the U.S. National Campaign to Stop Violence with the intention to reduce youth violence.

- Literacy Shaping Our Lives: Ask students to interview family or community members about a favorite read. Ask them how literacy is significant in their everyday life. Share the conversations in class.
